

PRIDE It is a sad day when the grocery store and gas station in your town close. The PRIDE program helps communities to help themselves. When we did the PRIDE survey last fall, we did not address how much support there was to be able to buy groceries or gas in Potwin. We would like to explore this issue at the Potwin PRIDE meeting on November 16 at 7:00 PM at the Community House. Jan Steen from Kansas State PRIDE will be there to help us. Everyone is invited to come explore the need to be able to buy groceries in Potwin. Before then we would like to have some input from the community as to whether they would support a grocery store or a convenience store. Fill out the survey at the bottom of this article and return it to the city office by November 10.

Good news! The total vegetables harvested at the Ken Whittington Memorial Plant a Row for the Hungry Garden this year is 5,979 pounds. 12 youth and 10 adults dug 704 pounds of sweet potatoes October 30. The biggest one we weighed was four pounds and there were many that weighed three to three and a half pounds along with a lot of smaller ones. The adults dug the two rows with the youth picking up the potatoes. After the rows were dug, the youth took the potato forks and dug about 75 pounds where the vines had spread.

Two adults picked the last 141 pounds of tomatoes on October 26 before the freeze. We have picked 3,493 pounds of tomatoes this year. One adult and one youth pulled 168 pounds of turnips on October 26. This was the last of the 629 pounds grown this year. The next workday at the garden will be to clean off the tomato plants and cages.

We will have some sweet potatoes available for the community one day of the week for a couple of weeks at the Methodist Church garage. It will usually be on Tuesday or Thursday depending on the weather.

Frederic Remington Area Historical Society Presents

Roy Beckemeyer will present *Giant Dragonflies, Australia, and a Small Town in Kansas:*

Investigating a 1920's Mystery. This presentation focuses on fossils found in a ridge of rocks that passes through Dickinson, Marion, and Harvey Counties and continues south into Oklahoma. When these rocks are cracked, embedded in the rocks are fossils of insects including dragonflies with wingspans up to thirty inches. Dr. Beckemeyer will tell the story of how a small spot in central Kansas came to the attention of a renowned Australian paleontologist and how he came to visit. Also, how fossils of giant insects, steamships, railroad trains, land grant colleges, long-lost photographs, and kidney stones are all part of the puzzle. Dr. Beckemeyer is a retired engineer and author of the 2015 Kansas Notable Book "Music I Once Could Dance to: Poems."
