On Monday, October 14, seven adults and five youth dug 242 pounds of sweet potatoes, pulled 166 pounds of turnips with the tops, and cleared off the tomato cages and vines. We want to thank those who have helped with the garden this year.

On Saturday, October 19, PRIDE had a workday to start making the downtown look better at the old station. Two adults and two youth scraped and primed part of the sign post and pulled weeds out of cracks in the cement.

Thanksgiving! Doesn't it make you feel warm and fuzzy when you think about the holiday? I always thought everyone felt that way until my daughter came home from work one day and told me how sorry she felt for a coworker. She was telling him how excited she was for Thanksgiving, and he said he was dreading it. She asked, "How come?" and he said all the holiday was good for was to watch fights between his aunts and uncles, so he usually hid out in the bedroom. Chanda was amazed. She describes our Thanksgivings as a Rockwell painting. My mom always got out the good dishes, hooked up tables to make one big long table and we would sit 25 people down to eat. She also always had us say what we were thankful for, before we said grace. I'm glad my daughter has these lovely memories. I try to do some things the same, but I don't have a big enough dining room to have a long table. Oh well, we make adjustments as we go.

As for the food, pecan pie is a stable (along with the required turkey, dressing, mashed potatoes and gravy). My son always wants green bean casserole, but once in a while, we will change it up and have a vegetable mix simply called Favorite Vegetable Dish. Here are the recipes for the vegetables and pecan pie.

Favorite Vegetable Dish

1 can French style green beans, drained 1 can white shoe peg corn

1 can sliced water chestnuts 1 jar (2 oz.) chopped pimento

1 cup sour cream 1 can cream of celery soup

2/3 cup chopped onion 1 cup grated cheddar cheese

Topping:

½ cup butter, melted (1 stick)

35 crushed Ritz crackers

½ cup sliced almonds

Layer vegetables in butters casserole dish. (beans, corn, water chestnuts, pimento)

Combine rest of ingredients (except topping) and spread on top of vegetables. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Mix butter and cracker crumbs. Sprinkle on top of vegetables, then sprinkle the almonds on top of crackers.

Bake in 350 degree oven for 35 to 40 minutes.

Pecan Pie

The base for this pie is my Aunt Ruth's Chess Pie, so is not as sweet as the ones made with corn syrup.

1 c. white sugar ½ cup packed brown sugar

2 eggs ¼ cup milk

¼ cup melted butter 1 tablespoon cornmeal

1 teaspoon vinegar 1 teaspoon vanilla

1 tablespoon flour 1 ½ cups pecan halves

Mix all ingredients and pour into an unbaked pie shell 45 minutes-60 minutes at 350 degree oven. Inserting a knife into center of pie at 45 min. can tell you if it is done, or needs to cook longer. Do not cook over 1 hour, it will thicken as it cools. You might protect your edges of your crust with foil or a silicone pie crust protector. Let cool and add topping, if desired.
