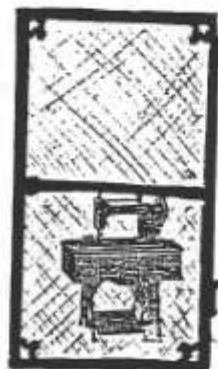

JUST FISHIN'



No first hand information this time; work has kept me too busy to go fishing. What I have for you is information gathered from other fishermen. It seems that at El Dorado Lake there is an oxygen depletion problem below the twenty foot level. Most crappie are being caught from five to fifteen feet deep. This pattern is not normal for this time of year, normally they are from fifteen to twenty-five feet deep. The bass also seem to be holding in flooded creek channels in this depth range.

White bass according to reports are following normal patterns. Trolling on wind swept points with shad imitating lures that run from ten to fifteen feet deep will get you plenty of whites and occasionally a walleye.

With the hunting and football season underway our lakes do not have the boating pressure they had just a few weeks ago. From now till about mid November fishing from a boat or from the bank will improve dramatically. Now is the time to go fishing if you like peace and quiet when you are fishing.

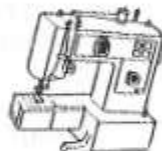

CITY WIDE GARAGE SALE

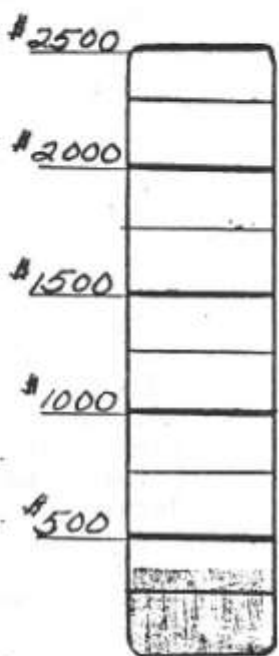

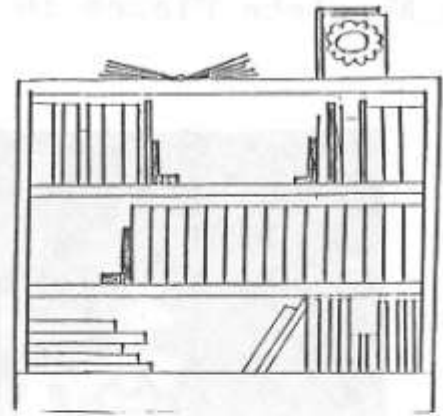
POTWIN PTO

Potwin Athlete Places in Nationals



Kris Summers has spent the summer running track for the Wichita Shocker Striders.

She participated in the AAU meets qualifying for the AAU Junior Olympic Nationals in San Antonio, Texas. She placed fourth in the 100 meter high hurdles, fifth in the heptathlon (seven events), seventh in the triple jump and tenth in the long jump.

Kris also competed in the Athletic Congress National Qualifying meet in Arlington, Texas placing third in the 400 meter hurdles, fifth in triple jump and sixth in 100 meter high hurdles. She also competed at the TAC National Championships held in Spokane, Washington taking ninth in the 100 meter high hurdles and tenth in the triple jump.

The Shocker Strider Track Club presented Kris with a Heart of A Champion Award which was given to 6 team members, meeting these qualifications; a desire to win, willing to work hard, to do their best, courage to try new things, ability to come back from defeats, seeking to improve, ability to keep on going when you are hurting, and to try to see yourself as not what you are, but what you can become.

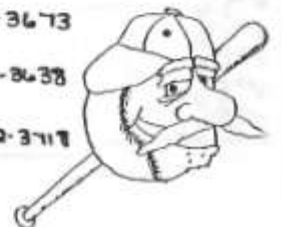

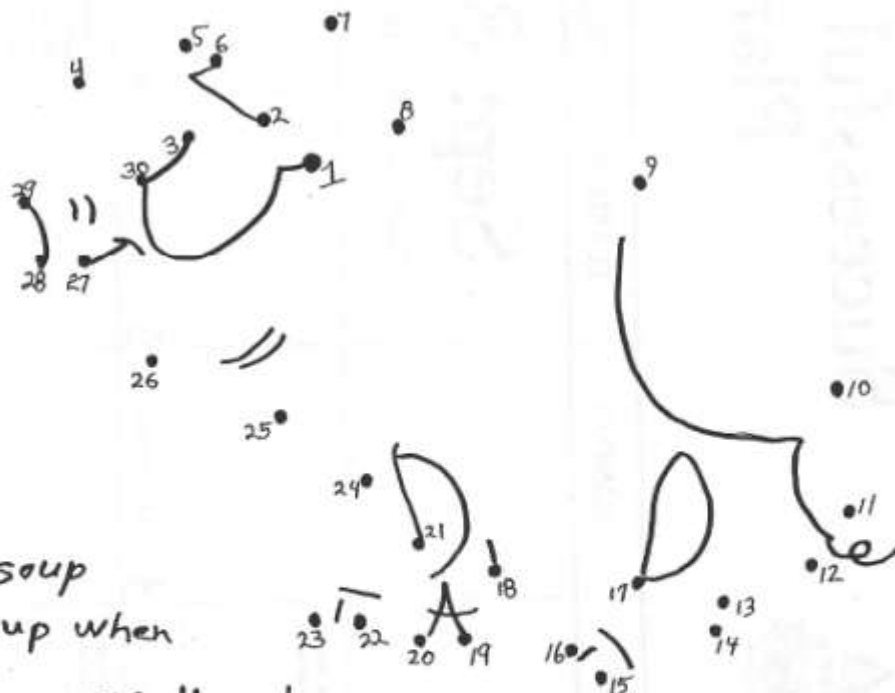
