Potwin PRIDE History

In 1985, **Melvina Jones** was the chairperson of the PRIDE steering committee with **Doris McLain** vice-chairperson and **Carlene Sommers** secretary-treasurer. **Tom Sommers** was youth chairperson with Melvina and **Ron Pugh** as adult youth sponsors. This was the year of the Potwin centennial celebration and **Carol Williamson** was the fourth grade teacher at the Potwin Elementary School. She asked if there was a project her class

could do and it was decided that they could plant flowers in barrels at the King Park, city building, community house and Post Office. Later the barrels at the community house and Post Office were removed, but the fourth grade class has planted the other flower barrels every year until in 2019 when it didn't work for them to plant them before school was out, but two fourth graders did plant them.

In 1986, **Warren McLain** was chairperson with Melvina vice-chairperson and **Opal Graf** secretary-treasurer. **Craig Jones** was youth chairperson and Melvina was the sponsor. This year or the year earlier, Warren and Doris McLain, **Francis Grabner**, Tom Sommers, Craig and Melvina Jones attended the PRIDE Day at Kansas State University at Manhattan. Tom and Craig rode in the back seat of Warren's station wagon facing backwards. Warren learned about making homemade Christmas trees for the light poles. He had **Jack Wallace** weld the current trees that the city puts up each year. We strung the garland and lights on them. The garland has been replaced once since then.

In 1987, Melvina was chairperson with Warren vice-chairperson and Opal secretarytreasurer. Craig was still youth chairperson and Melvina youth sponsor.

In 1988, Melvina was chairperson with **Dean Schmidt** vice-chairperson and **Pat Kasper** secretary-treasurer. Craig and Melvina were still on the youth committee. In those days, we took pictures of our projects and put them in a project record book to be judged. Doris McLain put the project books together for several years. We also had a community visit from a panel of judges. At PRIDE Day, awards were given. Potwin received the 5th place community cash award of \$100 and media merit award for "This Is Potwin" newsletter.

In 1989, Melvina was chairperson, Dean vice-chairperson, and **Eleanor Smith** secretary-treasurer. Awards that year included 1st place community cash award of \$500, leadership excellence award, and community outreach excellence award.

Greetings all,

We are all going through some challenging times where social distancing appears to be the current normal. I, along with all the Sheriff's Department employees, are still on the job serving the county and the City of Potwin. With the current Covid-19 situation Butler County has mandated safety precautions to be followed by all county personnel interacting with the public. This includes the wearing of a face mask while in close contact with the community. As a result, please don't be offended if I minimize interaction with groups, or talk to you from a distance. If you call 911 with a medical issue expect we will show up at your home wearing a mask and gloves. Again, this is for both your safety, and that of your family, as well as our safety and the safety of our families.

Also, as long as we are spending time at home, this might be a good opportunity to ensure your address is prominently displayed on your residence. Having your address clearly marked could save precious seconds or minutes for responding emergency personnel to reach you. In severe medical situations seconds could be the difference between life and death. Please, clearly post your address in a visible location on the front of your house.

Finally, I have had some recent complaints about subjects shooting firearms from the roadway and bridges into private property in the Potwin area. This is not only illegal but very dangerous. Kansas State Statue prohibits the discharge of a weapon from any roadway, or on (into) private property without the property owners consent. Offender(s) caught shooting off of the roadway or bridges will be prosecuted. Offenders shooting on or into private property will be prosecuted at the property owner's request. We want to ensure everyone's safety as well as protect livestock in the fields. (K.S.A. 21-6308 / Criminal discharge of a firearm)

Hello Potwin:

I hope everyone is staying safe and well in these unprecedented times. I know you are all probably tired of cooking, or maybe you just need a couple of new recipes to get you back in the mood. I have a spaghetti recipe that I have been making for over 50 years that my grandkids love. (My kids did too!) They kind of turn their noses up at the jar sauce, and it is easy to make and so delicious. I always make the sauce, then put my water on to boil for the spaghetti (I always use angel hair, because I like the thinness of it) but use whatever spaghetti you want.

SPAGHETI MEAT SAUCE

1 pound ground beef
1 can chopped tomatoes
1 6 ounce can tomato past
1 or 2 - 8 ounce cans tomato sauce (depends on how saucy you want it)
Salt and pepper to taste
1 T. minced garlic or two cloves fresh garlic, minced
1 small onion, chopped
1 teaspoon paprika
½ teaspoon dried basil
¼ teaspoon dried marjoram
¼ teaspoon parsley flakes
1/8 teaspoon celery salt
¼ teaspoon dry mustard
2 teaspoons Worcestershire sauce
1 pound spaghetti or angel hair pasta

Brown ground beef, onion, salt, pepper and garlic. Drain grease and add rest of ingredients. Be sure to measure spices, because too much of one kind will make the sauce bitter. While cooking sauce on simmer, (you can simmer it up to 2 hours if you want) heat water for spaghetti and cook according to directions. Serve with salad and garlic bread, if desired.

We must always have dessert! This pie is really easy and good, but it must be served warm. If you have some left over, just put it in the microwave for 15 seconds and it's just as yummy as the first time!

EASY CHOCOLATE CHIP PIE

½ cup flour
½ cup granulated sugar
½ cup packed brown sugar
2 eggs, beaten

¾ cup soft butter1 cup chocolate chips1 cup chopped walnuts9 inch pie crust



Line a 9-inch pie plate with pie crust, (boughten or homemade)

Blend flour, sugar, and brown sugar into eggs, add butter, mixing well. Fold in chocolate chips and walnuts. Pour into pie crust. Bake at 325 degree oven for 55 minutes or until knife inserted into middle of pie comes out clean. Serve warm with a side of ice cream.
