We have harvested 2,849 pounds of produce at the Ken Whittington Memorial Plant a Row for the Hungry Garden. That includes 1,687 pounds of tomatoes and the first 17 pounds of turnips that were pulled on September 21. It also includes about 134 pounds of watermelons that Bertha planted and watered in the garden. The Dyck family who have helped for several years, but have moved to Texas recently, got the first one that weighed 28 pounds. There was one that weighed 35 pounds and one that weighed 21 pounds. There were about 25 melons on the four plants.

We have planned workdays to make improvements at the old station, but have decided to wait to see if it is going to be torn down within a year before putting more time into the project.

JoAnn loves to buy old cookbooks at garage/estate sales and then we both go through them and mark what we want to try. The best ones are from churches with their down-home recipes, so the pork chops and the Lemon Blossoms are from two old cookbooks. Which ones, I have no idea as we have been through a lot of them. Creamy Pork Chops

- 4 pork chops
- 1 can cream of chicken soup
- 1 packet of Hidden Valley Ranch Dressing Mix

Place pork chops in bottom of crock pot. Pour soup on top and sprinkle packet of dressing mix on top. Cover and cook on high for 4 hours or low for 6 hours. Can serve with mashed potatoes or over rice.

Lemon Blossoms

- 1 box yellow cake mix
- 1 3.5 oz. pkg Instant Lemon pudding mix
- 4 large eggs
- 34 cup vegetable oil

Glaze

4 cups powdered sugar 1/3 cup fresh lemon juice Zest of 1 lemon 3 tablespoons vegetable oil 3 tablespoons water

To make glaze, sift the sugar into a mixing bowl. Add the lemon juice, zest, oil, and water. Mix with a spoon until smooth.

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Spray miniature muffin tins with vegetable oil cooking spray. Combine the cake mix, pudding mix, eggs and oil and a blend well with an electric mixer until smooth, about 2 minutes. Pour a small amount of batter, filling each muffin tin half way. Bake for 12 minutes or until tops are lightly browned. Turn out onto a tea towel or rack. With fingers, (I used two forks) dip the cupcakes in glaze while they are still warm, covering as much of the cake as possible, or spoon the glaze over the warm cupcakes, turning them to completely coat. Place on wire rack with waxed paper underneath to catch any drips and let the glaze set thoroughly, about an hour, before storing in containers with tight fitting lids.






