Potwin PRIDE news

Plan to have a garage sale during the city wide garage sales June 11 & 12. Well, April seems it can't make up its mind if it's spring or winter! Brr!! Maybe May will be better. I hope so anyway. We know it will heat up in May for sure. But I do have a simple Cheesy Chicken Casserole that is good. It is simple and maybe you can use your oven before it gets really hot. It seems like I found this recipe on the back of a rice box or from one of my old, old cookbooks.

Cheesy Chicken Casserole

4 chicken breasts

1 cup long grain rice, uncooked (not instant)

½ teaspoon onion powder

½ teaspoon garlic powder

½ teaspoon salt

1/8 teaspoon pepper

1 can Cream of chicken soup

1 (14.5 oz.) can chicken broth

1 cup shredded sharp cheddar cheese



Mix rice, cheese, onion powder, garlic powder, salt and pepper, soup and broth together and place in a greased 9x13 pan. Place chicken breasts on top of mixed ingredients. Sprinkle more shredded cheese on top. Cover tightly with foil and bake in 350 degree oven for 50 minutes, or until chicken is done. Serve with a vegetable or salad.

Now, if it gets too hot in the kitchen, maybe you don't want to turn on the oven for dessert. I have a chocolate waffle cookie that is really good. You bake them in the waffle iron, so no hot oven. This recipe did come from an old church cookbook, maybe 1985? Anyway, these are good cookies.

Waffle Cookies

Frosting

¾ cup cocoa

¼ cup cocoa

1 cup butter, softened

½ cup brown sugar

4 eggs

½ cup water

2 cup flour

¼ cup butter

1 tablespoon baking powder

1 pound powdered sugar (4 cups)

2 teaspoons vanilla

1 ½ cup sugar

Mix ingredients (batter will thick) and drop by teaspoons (one teaspoon per quarter of waffle iron) in a hot waffle iron. Bake for only 1 minute. Remove carefully from waffle iron with rubber pancake turner to wire rack and let cool.

After cookies are cool, frost with frosting.

Frosting instructions:

Mix all ingredients **except** powdered sugar in a medium saucepan on medium heat and bring to a boil. Boil for 3 minutes. Then add in powdered sugar and stir until completely mixed. Spread over each cookie. Frosting will be a little runny, but will harden as it cools, so it's important to frost cookies quickly. Let frosting set before storing them in airtight container. I usually line my stacks with wax paper between each layer.
