Plan to have a garage sale during the city wide garage sales June 11 & 12. A signup sheet is on the bulletin board at the Post Office or you may pick one up at the city office and return it to the city office or to Melvina Jones by June 7

On May 6, 3 adults and 3 youth worked at the Ken Whittington Memorial Plant a Row for the Hungry Garden tilling, planting corn, and putting flags to mark where the tomatoes would be planted. On May 10, 9 adults and 6 youth planted 94 tomato plants. We still plan to plant 16 more when they get big enough and it is dry enough. We want to thank **Kelly Whittington** and family for growing the tomatoes again this year. On May 13, 3 adults and 5 youth tilled the potatoes, hoed the potatoes, and made ridges for the sweet potatoes. On May 20, Melvina got 75 sweet potato slips to plant when it is dry enough. The cucumbers have also been planted.

On May 7, the Remington Elementary School fourth graders planted the flowers at King Park and city building. We want to thank **Charlie Baker** for keeping all the flowers watered and painting and straightening the signs at the city building and King Park.

We would like to thank the city and **Bill Lappan** for his help with the flower barrel and sign projects at King Park and city building. We would also like to thank him for filling in the old railroad track to make it **BEHIND EVERY**

smoother. He is planning to retire September 3.

We are planning to put up a new sign at the old gas station.




JUST A REMINDER ABOUT POTWIN'S CURFEW!

Preschoolers - MUST be 4 years of age on/or before August 31, 2021.

Kindergarteners - MUST be 5 years of age on/or before August 31, 2021.

Roundup will be held at Remington Elementary 200 East Ellis Potwin, Kansas.

Screenings are mandatory prior to entering into Preschool or Kindergarten.

Did you know?

According to Potwin City Ordinance No. 700, it is unlawful to litter in or on city streets, sidewalks, alleys, parks or other public right of ways in the city. This includes grass clippings blown into the street from your mower. Accumulation of the clippings leads to clogging in the city drains and causes flooding when it rains; this can be a real problem for the homes and businesses located near those drains. It is also against city code (Ch. 8, Article 2, Sections 8-401) to have weeds or indigenous grasses on residential property exceeding 12 inches, as these are considered a blighting influence.



The city limb pile out by the ball diamonds is for *limbs, logs, and wood with no nails only*. There is a sign as you enter the area with a list of what is not permitted. Recently there have been items such as tennis shoes, clothing, metal, wood with nails in it, and grass clippings in the pile. The pile is



randomly spot checked by the state and the city could lose their permit for a burn pile if it contains items other than limbs, resulting in Potwin residents having to take all limbs to the county landfill.



With the **4**th of July holiday approaching, here are a few important things for the city residents to be aware of: The discharge of fireworks within the city limits is permitted only on the following times and dates:

June 27^{th} through July 3^{rd} 10 a.m. – 10 p.m.

July 4th 10 a.m. – Midnight

July 5<sup>th</sup> 10 a.m. – 10 p.m.
```

All fireworks must be fired on private property.

Children under 10 years of age must have adult supervision.

Hello Summer! With Memorial Day over, you know it's the beginning of summer and all the kids will be out riding bikes and begging to go to the swimming pool. I know that summer is not the time to heat up the oven, but we have cool rainy days too and that would be a great day to have the kids help make homemade pizza crust. Depending on the size of your pizza pan or pizza stone, you might get one or two crusts from this recipe. Have them use their favorite toppings, then bake and enjoy! Have fun baking, LaVonne Baker

<u>Pizza Crust</u>

1 package dry yeast

- 3/4 cup warm water (105-115 degrees)
- 2 Tablespoons virgin olive oil
- 1 tablespoon honey
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 cups flour

Dissolve yeast in warm water and let stand for 5 minutes.



Add to a food processor and combine remaining ingredients. Pulse until dough starts to form a ball. (You could also use a mixer) Remove dough from processor and dust lightly with flour. Place in lightly floured bowl and cover with damp cloth. Let rise 45 minutes. While dough is rising, fix all the toppings such as browned hamburger or sausage or bacon. Cut up green pepper, or onion, or mushrooms, black olives, etc. Maybe put pepperoni on it. After 45 minutes, punch down dough. Divide into two balls and roll thin. Pierce crust with fork in several places. Place on greased pizza pan, or ungreased pizza stone. Add pizza sauce (you can use store bought) then shredded mozzarella cheese, then toppings and more cheese. Bake in 450 degree for 12-18 minutes.

For dessert, here's a really simple cake that my sister-in-law Deloris makes, and she gave me the recipe.

Mexican Fruit Cake

20 ounce can crushed pineapple, juice and all


- 2 cups flour
- 2 teaspoons baking soda
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 cups sugar
- 2 eggs

1 cup chopped nuts (walnuts or pecans) Mix all ingredients together until well blended. Put in greased 13x9 inch pan. Bake in 350 degree oven for 35-40 minutes.

Frosting:

1-8 ounce bar cream cheese, softened
2 cups powdered sugar
1 stick melted butter
1 teaspoon vanilla
Mix all ingredients well and pour over hot cake.

Good Words from Chaplain Mike

This month we honor fathers on Sunday, June 20, and it is appropriate and Scriptural that we do this, as well as mothers in May. The fifth commandment tells us so in Exodus 20:12.

The Bible is replete with references to earthly fathers. Much counsel is given to them in the book of Proverbs. The New Testament gives them advice in Ephesians 6:4 and Colossians 3:21 regarding their children.

Another reference in the New Testament is to "fathers of the faith." Hebrews 11 talks about the patriarchs in the Old Testament—Abraham, Isaac Jacob and Joseph. Many other men are noted in that chapter, as being faithfully obedient to God. So, they are great examples for Christian men today.

But the greatest example to emulate is our Heavenly Father. Do a search study on "Father" in the Bible, especially the Gospel of John, and find out how great a God He is. He is the one we are to worship in "spirit and truth" (John 4:23). He is the one a Christian can cry to as "Abba, Father" (Romans 8:15). He is the "God of all comfort" (2 Corinthians 1:3). The list goes on! He is the perfect Father—perfect in character and in every way, whereas the gods and idols of this world are nothing. So, the greatest honor goes to the Heavenly Father!

For the Christian, I John 3:1 says it well: "Behold what manner of love the Father hath bestowed upon us, that we should be called the sons of God." (KJV)
